

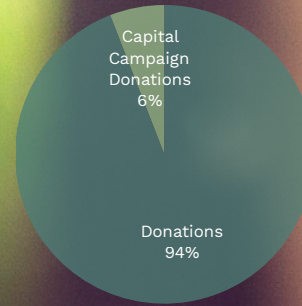

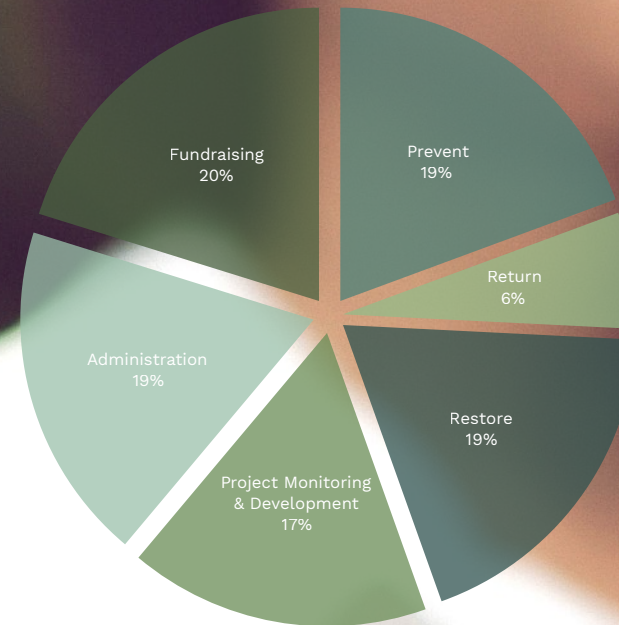
## International Headquarters (Canada) Income

A staff team of 10 at our International Headquarters works hard to oversee our programs in Cambodia, process donations, report back to our donors, and provide support services to our offices in Australia, the UK and USA.

For close to 30 years, Ratanak International has been dedicated to serving those who are vulnerable and exploited in Cambodia. Human trafficking robs people of their dignity, but we believe they are profoundly valuable. That is why this year, we continued our focus on serving those in greatest need with a model that seeks to empower Cambodians while confronting systems that drive human trafficking and exploit the vulnerable.

## Prevent

We equip Cambodians to prevent exploitation by raising awareness about human trafficking, sexual abuse and unsafe migration in rural communities. We also support income generation opportunities so that families have a source of sustainable income. By pairing awareness with better opportunities, we can help reduce the risk of unsafe migration and human trafficking.

**3 rice mill cooperatives** were formed in vulnerable communities to help decrease the risk of unsafe migration.

**8,265 Cambodians** learned how to protect their families from human trafficking through Community Heroes—local leaders of influence trained by our staff.

## Protect

We work collaboratively to protect the vulnerable and confront systems of exploitation. In the current fiscal year all “Protect” activities were incorporated within the budgets of other programs.

Our staff in Cambodia had the privilege of presenting to the Cambodian arm of the COMMIT group, which collaborates on counter-trafficking initiatives with six Southeast Asian countries. We were able to share with them first-hand case studies of the trauma survivors of human trafficking face, and how Ratanak works to help their healing and reintegration. It was a thrill for us to be at the table, helping to build systems of stability, safety and justice.

## Return

We help victims of human trafficking return home. We also support the development of better systems that promote safe migration and protect Cambodians from being re-exploited.

**103 phone calls** on our emergency hotline from victims of exploitation.

**91 victims** of human trafficking received support to return home.

We opened a migration assistance centre at a major Thai-Cambodia border crossing. The centre provides basic needs support for migrants and identifies victims of exploitation to offer further help through other agencies.

## Restore

We persevere in love to restore survivors of exploitation. We walk alongside survivors on their journey of healing through counselling and holistic care. Our Community Home is open to victims who have been freed from trafficking and exploitation. Whether they choose to stay with us for a few days or a few months, we offer them encouragement and care for a new beginning. Our goal is to help them reach their God-given potential through vocational training, education and life skills.

**53 survivors** received support through the Ratanak Achievement Program (RAP).

When Choum\* arrived at the RAP Community Home, she knew almost immediately that she wanted to become a designer and tailor. She went to a local store for training and has been very committed to learning the craft. She has grown more and more confident in her skills, and is now able to design dresses and sew clothes for herself and for her customers.
