ABOUT US

Thirty years ago, Brian McConaghy saw video footage of a helpless child dying because she had no access to basic medicine. Her name was Ratanak, which means "precious jewel." She helped spark the beginning of a small project which God has grown beyond anyone's imagination. Thanks to your generosity and partnership, Ratanak International is now impacting some of the most challenging issues confronting Cambodia and the developing world. Through strategic partnerships, we are providing a continuum of care for survivors of human trafficking while confronting systems that exploit the vulnerable.

Prevent: We equip Cambodians to prevent exploitation by helping reduce their vulnerability to trafficking.

Return: We help victims of exploitation and human trafficking return home to safety.

Restore: We persevere in love to restore survivors of exploitation, walking alongside them on their journey of healing.

PREVENT

Prevention is stopping trafficking and exploitation before it happens, by training communities to protect their families. It also means breaking the cycle of poverty and exploitation in vulnerable families.

- **10,696 Cambodians** trained through human trafficking prevention workshops.
- 21,640 emergency contact cards distributed.
- 3 rice mills built, each with its own cooperative and marketing plan to operate the mills as a successful business.
- 2 rice mills increased their income by over 100% with just a few months of milling!


WHEN CHHEY'S HUSBAND PASSED AWAY, she had no way of supporting her four children. One by one, three of her children quit school and left home to find work in Thailand so their family could survive. "They couldn't get good work," Chhey said. "It was unsafe, and sometimes they didn't get paid from their boss." Her heart broke for her children, but she did not know what else to do.

*Ratanak Centre construction continued subsequent to this reporting period and was fully completed in October 2018.

Chhey joined the rice mill cooperative in its early stages, investing \$58 in two shares. By the end of the first year the cooperative had build \$228 in capital. Since then, the cooperative has continued to grow. She now owns 18 shares and has earned \$227 from her annual dividends! She is now using the profits to start a small nursery, selling local plants in the community. The rice mill cooperatives are helping make it possible for *her children to return home, so they are less* vulnerable to exploitation in Thailand.

RETURN

Your support is helping bring victims of human trafficking back home to safety. This is building a bridge to freedom and reuniting families.

RESTORE

Because of you, survivors of human trafficking are realizing their dignity, and learning that they are not alone on their journey of healing. Our staff offer counselling, training and care so they can start rebuilding their lives and achieve their fullest potential.

- 266 counselling sessions to help restore survivors to wholeness.
- 27 survivors were employed full-time.
- 69 survivors re-integrated back into their communities.

- •131 survivors of human trafficking returned to Cambodia.
- 2,934 people served with emergency food and water at our migration assistance centre which provides basic needs support and identifies

• **112 survivors** received support through the Ratanak Achievement Program.

- **114 women** in the adult entertainment industry learned important life skills that
- can help them transition into healthy and safe working environments.

ONY GREW UP ON A RURAL FARM IN CAMBODIA. Her parents made very little income and struggled to support her, along with 6 siblings. When she was fourteen years old, her mom brought Mony to Phnom Penh to work as a housemaid. For four years, she was paid \$20 per month. She usually worked through lunch to complete her chores, and she remembers still being forced to pay for glassware she accidentally broke or clothes that were torn. She slept outside on the porch, without cover from rain. She worked for 10 years, cleaning and washing every day. A kind couple and another NGO helped her escape after she was found crying one day in one of the rooms owned by her employer.

> When Mony first came to RAP (the Ratanak Achievement Program), she was nervous, worried and full of fear. But after a few days, she started to trust our staff. Slowly, she began sharing with us her story and what she was feeling. She started a journey of healing. Mony is now learning how to cook at a training centre. "I never thought that I could have a better life," she told us. "I felt hopeless in the past, but now I'm able to survive with hope for the future. I am very grateful to RAP staff and to those who have helped me to survive again. I felt that this is like a dream that I had never expected!"

She still struggles with fear. Whenever she leaves the building she can't help but feel scared that those who abused her will find her and force her to return to slavery. But she's courageously facing her fears, and refusing to let them stop her from building a life of dignity and freedom.
